

EES Chorus

I know that many of you grew up in Vermont where, for most of your lives, ticks were not an issue. I grew up in Connecticut and spent a lot of time down at the shore. I knew people who lived on the shore where ticks were an occasional oddity. No big deal. I was in college in NH by the time Lyme disease was identified as a tick borne illness in 1977, but there weren't many ticks in the mountains of NH, so it didn't seem an issue. Even as my four children and our dogs played in the woods of the Northeast Kingdom, I never saw one tick on any of them. Since then, I've had friends who have been infected with Lyme Disease beginning around 2008. The fact that it was not common in Vermont actually delayed the diagnosis to the detriment of those who had it. Doctors were not really looking for it a decade ago - especially if the classic symptoms were not there.

I've taken more time to learn about the disease since our school nurses have gotten updates from the Department of Health concerning the illness. I was shocked at the spread of the ticks and the disease over time. Maps provided on the Department of Health website showed that I didn't have to worry as a mom in the Northeast Kingdom or most of Vermont as my children were growing up. That would not be the case for any part of the state of Vermont now. Ticks and the disease they carry are now found throughout the entire state. We have already had children coming into our nurse with several ticks on them this spring. As we enter the summer months, it is wise to know more about how to avoid ticks and what to do should you find that you or one of your family members has a tick. The infected ticks are usually in the nymph stage and very small; about the size of the tip of a pencil.

Avoidance is simple. Avoid high grass and bushy areas as much as possible. Wear long pants and long sleeves. Tuck pants into socks to keep ticks out. Wear light colored clothing in order to see ticks.

Use a Tick Repellent. The recommendations can be found on various websites. Treating your clothing and gear with a repellent is also recommended.

Look for ticks! When you come back inside, taking a bath or shower within two hours is recommended so you can really look for ticks. Remember, they're small so you really have to look. One could look like a speck of dirt. Teach your children what to look for. Pay special attention to armpits, head, and folds of skin.

Removing ticks with a fine tipped tweezer as soon as possible. It can take up to 36 hours for Lyme Disease bacteria to be transmitted so the earlier you remove the tick, the better. Wash your hands and the bitten areas with soap and water or rubbing alcohol.

Lyme Disease can be very painful and debilitating if not treated. While one identifying symptom may be a red rash around a bite, it is not always present and many times, people don't know that they've been bitten. Other symptoms may be fatigue, chills, fever, joint pain and headache. Symptoms are often confused with other illnesses but there are tests for Lyme Disease to eliminate it as a possibility if some of the symptoms are present or you know you or your child has been bitten by a tick. Lyme Disease can be treated with antibiotics early on with good success.

We all love summer here in Vermont. Being proactive and preventing this illness from impacting your family is a great way to insure your enjoyment

PERSONAL SAFETY CLASSES

Dear Parents/Guardians: During the month of May, I have been teaching classes about personal safety. These lessons have been adapted from the research based programs, *Care For Kids* (K-2) and *We Care Elementary* (3-5). These experiential and interactive curricula focus on helping children build empathy, develop healthy communication skills, and understand boundaries. Additionally, *Care For Kids* teaches students the anatomically correct names for the private parts of their bodies (penis, vagina, buttocks), as this has been shown to increase communication skills and serve as a protective factor.
