I often wonder if we could get Congress to consider aligning the time change we will be making this weekend with Halloween. Daylight savings time and Halloween both create disruption for children in terms of sleep and that impacts their level of energy (or their exhaustion) in school. Why not combine the two! Wouldn't it be great to have an extra hour of sleep after trick or treating? (Of course, that would require that leaders actually consider the state of the nation through the needs of children.)

In my idealistic world, if I were President, I would have a Secretary of Children as part of the Cabinet and at Department of Children, whose purpose would be to look at proposed actions of the legislators and the executive branch in terms of impact on children. For example, when things like minimum wage or housing are considered, what would be the impact on children in terms of access to their parents if there was a liveable wage and affordable housing? How much better would all children be if we recognized that our future workforce was dependent on developing socially and emotionally healthy humans and that is an investment of 18 years which requires that parents are able to be more involved - and that parental involvement by industry was supported and encouraged as a long term investment in our society. If I were President, this is where I'd be directing my energies.

I think the traditional greeting of the Masai and the philosophy behind it could change our culture for the better. That greeting is, "And how are the children?" The significance is that the emphasis of the culture is to insure that the proper caring for the children is the responsibility of all, and the young warriors with no children of their own adopt that responsibility as an important aspect of their role.

I realize I started with a simple thought of thinking about how Daylight Savings Time could be changed, from impacting children to benefiting children, while still benefitting adults; wouldn't it be better if we came from a place of caring and asking "and how are the children"?

#### SCHOOL CALENDAR REVISIONS

The following changes to the 2017-18 District Calendar have been made to account for student days lost during the work stoppage in September. These school days are being made up in March rather than June to allow for greater instructional value and to prevent extending the school year.

--School will be in session on **Tuesday**, **March 6** (Town Meeting Day), ending spring break one day earlier for students. Teacher in-service will no longer take place that day.

--Thursday, March 22 will now be a full day of school. It was originally scheduled for a half-day followed by parent/teacher conferences.

--Friday, March 23 will now be a half-day of school for students followed by parent/teacher conferences. It was originally scheduled as a "no school" day in the District and a full day of conferences.

There will be added time made available for spring parent/teacher conferences to accommodate this modified District calendar. This will happen on a school by school basis. The tentative last day of school remains Wednesday, June 13th as originally planned, subject to change if there are snow days this winter. Any snow days that occur will be made up in June.
