I have found the discussion regarding the school budget very concerning because of the emphasis on a tax rate rather than what our dollars are doing for

students. Simply put, you get what you pay for. The dollars have an impact on students, either directly as in classroom teachers, interventionists and specialists, or indirectly as in administrators, buildings and grounds and Central Office. My doctoral research indicates a clear relationship between investment in direct instruction and student achievement. That relationship grows over time - positively or negatively depending upon the level of investment. The closer the investment (spending) is to students, the greater the relationship to student achievement. I have presented these results nationally at conferences, and to the Vermont State House and Senate Education Committees, the Secretary of Education and Governor Phil Scott.

The stated goal of Burlington School District is to reduce our achievement gap which is the difference in math and literacy achievement that can be seen between demographic groups - as in lower income, students of color, English Language students etc. This means that students who have had fewer opportunities actually have to achieve more in order to catch up to students who have had more opportunities than they and requires additional support.

The budget proposed at last Tuesday's School Board Meeting included \$420,000 for Interventionists, cutting the number in half. Every elementary school currently has two interventionists; one for math and one for literacy. The interventionists are experts in teaching in math or literacy with specific training in methods that enhance learning for students who are struggling. The budget proposal would require us to choose between literacy or math. Both skills are essential to the long term success of our children as they grow into adulthood.

The work of the interventionists is critical to every school. Our enrollment numbers require their focus to be on Kindergarten, first and second grades, working to fill in gaps in learning. We would all benefit from an additional interventionist for grade 3-5 in math especially but our budget doesn't support that. The work of the interventionists also includes working with our faculty to enhance their methods and skills to improve first-best instruction. They push into classrooms, co-teaching, and they plan with teachers in reviewing results of assessments to adjust instruction to meet the needs of our students.
