From the Principal's Desk

I am delighted that the Burlington School Board supported the flying of the "Black Lives Matter" at BHS. In saying that, I think it is important that adults help our children understand the context of that statement. "Black Lives Matter" does not mean that other lives don't matter. It means that Black lives matter <u>as much</u> as other lives, in all the opportunities that exist here in the United States. Helping children to understand that there are many opportunities that have been denied because of the color of people's skin; that there are still examples of the prejudice in our society which diminishes others' experiences and opportunities as members of our society is the reason for the "Black Lives Matter" movement and flaa.

Helping children to understand the context of the movement and the flag is important because they may see messages from those who want to minimize the importance of the movement. This has happened where statistics have been used to make it appear that there is not a need to acknowledge where racism is still injuring members of our society.

Presenting statistics that may be accurate as pure numbers but that lack context is a great example of the old adage, "Statistics don't lie, Statisticians do". Of course all lives matter, but when there is real disproportionality in how people are treated, it is necessary to confront that which allows that disproportionality to exist in order to fix it.

Martin Luther King said it best when he said, "True compassion is more than flinging a coin to a beggar. It comes to see that an edifice that produces beggars needs restructuring". Unfortunately, the edifice of institutionalized racism still exists in our society. Any system that marginalizes a people for whatever reason needs restructuring.

We will be working harder to help students develop the skills to recognize the need to delve deeper when statistics are used to promote a position; to question and examine the relevance of the numbers, as well as the sources and even, as students become more capable, the motivation of those sources. Teaching students the importance of critically examining sources and context when looking at statistics is an important step in restructuring an edifice that is harmful.
