Part of the work we do here is to teach social skills. You've probably seen the signs around the building that reinforce the need to be responsible, respectful and safe.

We've noticed an increase among our students of being a bit touchy and unkind to each other. While it isn't a terrible situation by any means, this year has been very calm so any increase is noticeable and we aim to "nip it in the bud". The issue is often a question of how children are choosing to react to a situation. For example, when a student feels physical contact in a crowded space, we've seen them react as if someone intentionally hit. An assumption of being hit or pushed quickly turns into retaliation - pushing, hitting or kicking the person they felt did them harm. Sometimes it isn't even the person who bumped into them. While we've all had knee-jerk reactions to situations, we grow to recognize that we do need to slow down and think before reacting.

The conversations we have with students after an incident of retaliation for a perceived harm reveal a sense that retaliation is the norm and expected - that somehow retaliating is a statement of their position in the world. This eye-for-an eye mentality may seem reasonable to them, but our experience is that it leads to an escalation of actions as each person increases their response making the climate unpleasant for all. Ironically, it is generally the person who last retaliated that is caught in the act. We work with students to help them consider that there are other ways to react to situations and slowing down enough to think is always going to be their best tactic. It takes practice and reinforcement. Some of the tactics that allow some time to think are counting to ten, breathing deeply, and stepping away from the situation to allow some space.

ANNOUNCING THE WINNERS OF THE BOX TOPS FOR EDUCATION CONTEST


DRUM-ROLL PLEASE!!!!!
