From the Principal's Desk

I know that all of you have heard about our Bee cards and the expectations that we have taught throughout the school. The expectations are very basic - Be Safe, Be Respectful and Be Responsible. The system is one that assumes that we need to actively teach those expectations as they appear in various settings. The work helps students understand that behaviors can adjust depending on the situation and the needs of others within the community. What is it that is happening in a setting - are we eating lunch? On the playground? In a classroom, the art room or the library? Are we on a field trip?

Each location demands some adjustment in what the community needs in order for everyone to be able to benefit from that environment. If it is a classroom, children need an environment that allows all to learn. Being respectful of learning for all means participating through listening and following directions, keeping voice levels at the levels that allow all to hear based on the activity taking place. Being responsible would look like taking care of the books and materials that are being used and doing the work that has been assigned. Being safe is perhaps the most complicated in that in includes both physical and emotional safety. It could look like having a calm body and allowing others enough space for their bodies. Being safe emotionally means including others, and insuring that comments are kind and constructive.

A shift in how to encourage behaviors comes in recognizing when the students are doing the right thing. This is done by looking for children who are doing what is expected and acknowledging their behavior, "I appreciate the way that you were able to get your work out and start so quickly" or "thank you for having your voice off in the hall and for following our expectations. This not only rewards desired behavior, it also serves as a subtle reminder to the other children. .

I wish I had known about this simple but effective way to teach behavior when I was raising my family. It would be simple to use the same system for the home; their, it really doesn't matter what the location is - bedrooms, the kitchen, bathrooms, yard, sidewalks, place of worship, or car. What is helpful is clearly stating the top two or three expectations you have for a location. For example, if I were to have expectations for the car, they would be: Be Safe - use seat belt,/car seat, voice calm. Be Respectful - hands and feet to self, share toys. Be Responsible - Throw away trash, carry your own stuff out.
