I have been very excited about the plans to improve the Edmunds Campus that are slated to begin this June. I have been reviewing the plans and making suggestions through the year. The plans have included input from the various municipal departments including Public Works, Public Safety and Zoning.

As many know, EES and EMS share the campus and our needs sometimes conflict because of the current design. The new design solves a number of problems including equity, security, accessibility, confidentiality, traffic, environmental impact (watershed) and enhancing early dismissals.

Equity - EES students will finally have a dedicated gym. The combined gym/cafeteria results in EES 110 students having to have gym in a space with concrete support posts and a ceiling so low that I can almost touch it and I'm 5'2".

Security - The building has too many entrances and EMS does not have a dedicated person to monitor security - making the entire campus less safe. The new design has one central entrance that will have a dedicated monitor.

Accessibility - We will have full accessibility to both sides of the complex for the first time with an elevator that goes from the cafeteria and up to the second floor, meaning that wheelchair bound individuals can enter the main entrance of the school and go to whichever school they want to access. Right now, anyone needing to get to the middle school has to go through the EES entrance in a circuitous route.

Confidentiality is improved. There is a conference room that will be available for meetings with parents, which allows us to better preserve confidentiality as the parents don't need to be in the area of administrative offices to meet with personnel.

Traffic flow - The way this is designed results in better overall traffic flow, especially for the Special Ed bus. There's more visitor parking. People on Main Street will not be impacted as badly by Edmunds Campus traffic twice a day (it's not just about the Edmunds Community). It gets kids away from the street. It will definitely help with supervision for students accessing CCTA buses at pick up and drop off.

Easier for early dismissal or late arrivals for parents. The central entrance will have a joint nurses office - for both schools with the health clinic centrally located. Students needing to be picked up from the nurse's office will be readily available instead of having to go to the office or the 2nd floor of either school where there are frequently students in the office for behavior reasons.

South Entrance - Dumpsters and delivery trucks being more appropriately located. Those dumpsters that are near where EES students play will be gone and they will be relocated.

Watershed/environmental improvement: Our current "green space" is constantly compromised by excessive student traffic because there are no sidewalks to the bus pick up areas. This results in the land not doing its job in terms of reducing storm water runoff. The new design allows foot traffic to remain on the sidewalks as students access their rides - whether buses or cars, better protecting the green space and its environmental function with the added bonus of looking far better. Our field is large enough to accommodate both schools' athletic needs during and after school, restricting the amount of compacted grounds to one area that will perpetually be compacted.

The improvements that are planned are really beautiful and include outdoor seating for lunch with green space. Quite an upgrade to a 100+ year old campus that is the first Burlington School seen by visitors to city.
