I frequently have children in my office who have been sent to me. I always ask the student what their understanding is of why they are in my office. There are three basic responses: an accurate retelling of their behavior; declaration of innocence which leaves out significant details of the story; or blaming the other person (which sometimes turns out to be true). No child wants to be in trouble for obvious reasons. They want to avoid the consequences including any punishment they may receive at home. Some immediately take responsibility for their choice of behavior while others take a bit longer, owning up once they know that we know the truth.

There are times when a student refuses to take any responsibility for their choice in behavior. They balk when asked to reflect on how their actions met the expectations of our school community, or may have harmed others. They place blame on others including the adults who identified their behavior, saying the adult "got them in trouble", "doesn't like them" or is mean.

The unwillingness to be introspective and take responsibility for choices is something that we work hard to correct. Difficulty with introspection can be based in many things including embarrassment, a lack of empathy, a need for control, fear of the consequence of the behavior or knowing that their trusted adults were likely to trust them above others. Regardless of the reason, failure to be introspective and take responsibility results in repeat behaviors. It can also result in peers avoiding a child who repeatedly harms them, leaving the student socially isolated.

Our children will always be able to give us their perspective, and it is important to listen. Hearing the other side of the story is also important. Motivation is key to discerning the truth. Is your child trying to avoid the consequence of your discovering their behavior or to gain your sympathy? Is the teacher trying to avoid repeat behaviors? I can tell you, that calling parents to tell them about a problem is never something I enjoy having to do, but it is important in helping children to grow into the successful people we all want them to be.

As we announced last week, EES was awarded a \$2500 "Artist In Schools" grant for students in grades 3-5, to work with the local artist Alexandra Turner, who will be working with students during art class on Tuesdays-Fridays for five weeks. Our students will be exploring the structures of native plants, minerals, and how fossils form over time. They will be immersed in geology, scientific drawing, outdoor plant collection, and will culminate with working with glass to create their own artwork on native plants fused into glass. If possible, please be certain that the glass in not in a wood casing that could contain leaded paint. All glass panels can dropped off to the art room at any time over the next two weeks.
