Who doesn't know the old Aesop Fable, "The Little Boy Who Cried Wolf"? I would venture to guess that the vast majority of you do, and yet, most of our students have never heard the story. For those unfamiliar with the tale, a boy was charged with watching the flock of sheep of the village to protect them from wolves. The boy grew bored and cried "Wolf". All the villagers ran to help, only to find the boy laughing at them, saying "I fooled you". This happened several times, angering the villagers. One day wolves arrived but when the boy cried "wolf", no one believed him and the sheep were lost.

We know that dishonesty in children will naturally occur as they experiment with lying. It is our responsibility to impress upon our children the importance of honesty. Children who lie learn that loss of trust is devastating and earning it back is very difficult. Those who get away with dishonesty do it more frequently. Some healthy skepticism when confronted with something you believe to be untrue is a good thing. Consequences for misbehaving that focus on repairing harm rather than punishment may result in children being more willing to be truthful. When lying does occur in addition to a misbehavior, it deserves a more serious consequence with a focus on the consequence because of a lie helps drive the message about honesty home.

Societies around the world rely on basic norms of behavior and honesty one such norm. The advantages of wealth and position have long been known but the recent college admissions scandal exposed the length's to which some would go to cheat. Those who applied to the colleges involved "in good faith", believing that the system was fair, were betrayed, especially those who were rejected despite having worked very hard. I can't help but think that the biggest losers are those who didn't get the life lessons of perseverance and hard work. Wouldn't the children have been better off learning the importance of hard work in their future rather than the public humiliation they now feel? Loving a child means knowing when to step back and let the child struggle to earn what they want.

#### RESEARCH PARTICIPANTS NEEDED!

Dr. Patricia Prelock from the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders in the College of Nursing and Health Sciences at the University of Vermont is currently seeking children either with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) or without ASD (typical), between the ages of 7 and 14 years old, to participate in a research study.

The purpose of this research study is to determine whether children with ASD can improve their theory of mind (ToM) through a social cognitive intervention using social stories. The study will involve a series of assessments; children will participate in a 9-week Social Story intervention as well as MRI/fMRI scanning visits. All assessment and treatment procedures will take place at either the University of Vermont Eleanor M. Luse Center, the University of Vermont Medical Center, or in your home.
