From the Principal's Desk

This Thursday, I introduced the concept of stewardship to our students at our Whole School Assembly. Stewardship is taking care of things. The idea of caring for things fits our school wide expectations of being safe, respectful and responsible and supports caring for our environment. Trash left on the grounds can end up in the lake as it washes down the hill. The energy it takes to replace lost or broken things adds to pollution in our environment that could be avoided by simply caring for what we have.

The students in third, fourth and fifth grade will be taking the lead on caring for our grounds by picking up any trash left behind from snacks or papers falling out of backpacks. Each grade has been assigned a day every week when they are the official stewards and will take some time to be in charge of picking up any trash they see. We will be adding the younger grades later in the year. We would like students to develop a sense of ownership of their campus and recognize that as stewards, they can take part in caring for their environment - whether their own room, their home, their school or their community.

This effort ties well into the School Strike for Climate that has been inspired by 16 year old, Swedish Climate Activist, <u>Greta Thunberg</u>. Greta has spoken to the U.N and other large organizations of power, holding adults accountable for their failure to address the serious threat Climate Change has on the earth; a threat that will impact generations to come without immediate action. The symbolism of the school strike is articulated by Greta, "Why should we bother to learn facts, when facts don't matter in this society".

This coming Friday, Sept. 20 a global strike is planned. Students and all who support the need for immediate changes in environmental policies will be marching and striking to demand that politicians pay attention to the scientists and make serious changes to slow and reverse climate change. The march in Burlington will be starting at UVM and head down Main St. to meet at City Hall at 12.

Students from UVM, Champlain, and St. Michael's College will be involved as well as older students from Burlington and surrounding communities. While we support the effort, EES will not be joining in the march or strike as a school because of the ages of our students and


CALENDAR CORRECTION!
