"An eye for an eye makes the whole world blind" - Mahatma Gandhi,

I have long admired the thinking of Mahatma Gandhi as exemplified by that simple statement. The quote is on the back of my door and there have been times this year when a student or two and I have read that and discussed what it means. They find themselves meeting with me because they didn't see a different way of dealing with an issue.

We have noticed that many of our students who have felt somehow slighted by a classmate will often resort to retaliation. If one child says something with a mean edge to it, the recipient often responds with something harsher, and so it goes; ratcheting up and up, tempers rising, and often an occasional push or shove. It becomes a power struggle that neither wins and results in a trip to the office. Once here, the process is to help the student(s) to consider their alternatives. What were all the choices they had when someone says or does something mean?

We have been working on equipping students with alternatives to retaliation. Those choices may be as simple as telling the person that what they said or did isn't ok, or to ask them to stop. It may involve simply walking away. There are times when students may need to go ask for help from adults. It will also involve learning how to negotiate. Whatever the strategy, we emphasize the importance of maintaining a respectful approach regardless of the other's behavior. All children here are a couple music resources that might be fun and need to learn strategies to deal with behavior that isn't acceptable because they will encounter people who behave badly throughout their lives. They need to be helped to see that retaliation is a poor strategy that often results in the opposite of what they actually want.

This is one of our expectations in terms of teaching social skills. Arming children with constructive, positive responses to the destructive behavior of others empowers them to know that they have the ability to defend themselves in a way that generates an acceptable resolution to a problem. This is important in terms of not creating a belief that only others can solve their problems. We want to develop healthy, resourceful people who believe in their own ability to solve their own problems. As a parent of four, there were times



when the same kind of retaliation happened in my house. It was frustrating to listen to two sides of a story and have two pairs of eyes looking to me to judge a situation that I neither saw nor heard, both with the expectation of a decision on "their side". The good news is that we don't have to be judge and jury. It is perfectly fine to focus instead on discussing the choices that both had to approach the problem so that they could peacefully coexist and have their individual wants met. A lot of the time, the issues can easily be avoided by teaching children to negotiate through speaking respectfully to each other, practicing some patience and compromising. Helping children to see that they both win when they can come to a mutually agreed upon decision. They will learn that they have the power to make their home a more peaceful place and they will become closer friends.
